Welcome to the first edition of our termly safeguarding newsletters.

Safeguarding and Child Protection is such an important issue for our children that we have decided to have

a termly newsletter to share key information and advice with parents and carers. We want to work together with the same aim of keeping children safe in school, at home and in the wider community.

At Carlisle Infant School, we feel it is really important to work in partnership with parents and high-quality support agencies to offer a safe environment that allows children to be aware of the risks they may face and how to respond to them safely.

Our school curriculum gives children opportunities to explore many of these issues in a safe situation - Personal, Social and Health Education, Relationships Education, Circle Time, and dedicated curriculum time in subjects such as science. These lessons equip our children with the knowledge, understanding and the right tools to make safe choices. Our safeguarding curriculum covers key concepts throughout the years at Carlisle Infant School and is adapted to include topical issues that arise in our community.

What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding is defined as:

- Protecting children from abuse and neglect
- Promoting children's mental and physical health and development
- Ensuring that children grow up in safe environments with good care
- Taking action to ensure the best outcomes.

Safeguarding covers a wide range of different aspects. These include types of abuse and how to spot them, reporting concerns, safer recruitment and promoting the welfare of children.

The role of the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) is critical to safeguarding.

What is a DSL?

A DSL is a senior member of staff who takes the lead responsibility for safeguarding and child protection. They ensure policies are followed and all staff know how to raise safeguarding concerns.

The DSL is responsible for referring concerns that meet a threshold to social care. They are also responsible for ensuring accurate and secure child protection records are kept. It is not the responsibility of the designated safeguarding officer to decide whether a child has been abused or not—that is the responsibility of statutory agencies such as Children's Social Work Services or the police.

At Carlisle Infant School, we provide all staff with regular and relevant safeguarding training and have four staff who are trained to form our safeguarding team. Please see below to find out who we are.

Spotlight on: CONSENT



Why teach my children about consent?

Communication, respect, and honesty are the building blocks of healthy relationships, and consent is about all of those things.

When we teach children about consent, we help them learn how to express what they want and don't want. We give them tools to express their limits and boundaries.

We teach them that they deserve to be treated in a respectful way. Teaching consent also means teaching children that it's just as important to respect others' limits and wishes. Their friends have a right to say "no" and "yes" and have that be respected.

Ways to teach children to ask for consent with other children:


Do you want to play with the red or blue car?

Safeguarding Curriculum

As part of our safeguarding curriculum, we use the NSPCC tool known as the TALK PANTS Underwear Rule https://www.nspcc.org.uk/keeping-children-safe/support-for-parents/pants-underwear-rule/ Children are taught to understand their body belongs to them, and they should tell a safe adult they trust if anything makes them feel upset or worried.

Each year we revisit the PANTS rules and during the summer term teachers use the Jigsaw curriculum to introduce children to the unit 'Changing Me'. This unit progressively teaches children to name body parts with the correct biological language and in KS1, children are taught to identify differences between male and female bodies.
